preface

In one of the executive meetings, I suggested that research outputs of DACUN member institutions contain author-prepared abstracts before publication and at the same time indexed. Everybody asked me who would do it. Bereft of hesitations, I volunteered the services of my colleagues in the Library Committee without consulting them first. Before I could even retract my silly idea, the execom assigned it to our committee. Not far from the table where the meeting transpired nonchalantly sat Alma Lacerna, PWC's head librarian, whose one ear was glued to our discussions with eyes popping up grudgingly reminding me to "do it yourself, good for you." When I reported the transcripts to the regular monthly meeting of the Committee, Sr. Maxima Remata, RVM, then Director of Libraries at UIC, and the group's disciplinarian, commented on my unsolicited braggadocio with "who do you think will do it Mr.," statement. That index and abstract of DACUN research outputs never materialized. As a result, the Library Committee embarked on it as a project of its sub-committee on special programs and projects.

Where to start and how to start it constitute one-half of the toughest questions the Committee faced with respect to abstracting and indexing. The other half was where to source the funds for its publication. Up to the time this abstract and index went off the press, the fifty-thousand peso proposal we sent to a prospective funding organization never received a reply. The committee's 11 members had no other recourse but to crack their heads. After resolving how to raise the amount needed for publication, preliminary work finally got off the ground. The executive board approved a recommendation to hold a seminar-workshop on abstracting and indexing on July 14-15, 2005 at the ACD. An inventory of subscribed and donated periodicals started in August 2005. Since abstracts are natural elements of theses and dissertations, these were also included in the stocktaking.

Edelin Columnas, abstracter cum indexer par excellence, my doting graduate professor in library science at MSU-IIT, accommodated in her itinerary our request for her to be our resource person. The activity was a huge success not only because the number of attendees far exceeded our expectations, but also because our vision of a DACUN abstract and index began to crystallize with the formation of separate technical working groups for abstracting and indexing.

Hard work started after the seminar – policy formulation, synchronization of work schedules, gelling, and leveling off on differences as to practices in abstracting and indexing. The last one was the hardest to iron out. One claimed that a particular author be followed. Another batted for somebody else. This contentious portion excluded what our indexers and abstracters had practiced through the years with abstracting and indexing being the waterloo of most librarians. New to a networked environment, members of the technical working groups needed time to adjust to a new organizational structure. Before these maiden issues saw print, consultations, discussions (and maybe at times some professional bickering), and endless meetings took place. Debates on technicalities opened the floodgates of delays to the more important and substantive aspects of the work. In the end, what was good for the

majority prevailed. And part of that contentious historical footnote focused on what to baptize the index and abstracts.

The Library Committee, with the concurrence of the Executive Board approved the DACUN Abstracts International (DAI) and the DACUN Index to Periodicals (DIP), with inspiration from and apologies to the Dissertation Abstracts International of UMI at Ann Arbor, Michigan, USA, and the Index to Philippine Periodicals of the University of the Philippines in Diliman. The word international was not coincidental, it was intentional. It is a vision the Library Committee wants to attain for DAI and DIP, locally produced abstracts and index attaining global prominence accessible by information professionals and specialists in both its hard and digital formats.

These maiden issues focus on the social sciences. The discipline was not deliberately chosen. It was borne by a preliminary research conducted two years ago when the DACUN Library Committee was at its puerile stage. Succeeding volumes will concentrate on humanities and the arts, religious studies, philosophy, psychology, engineering and other technology courses, nursing and health sciences, business, management and related fields, natural sciences, and language and literature.

Our abstract and index would not have become a reality had it not been for the tremendous support and a reservoir of goodwill we received from the following individuals and institutions: Chancellor Ricardo M. de Ungria of UP in Mindanao and concurrent president of DACUN who never blinked at anytime to the programs and projects of the Library committee; members of the executive board and committee for their unstinting support to our projects and for the financial influence over the vast resources of their respective institutions; members of the Library Committee who serve as the link between their administrations, the working groups and the advertisers and for facilitating the release of funds for all purposes and snacks during meetings held at their libraries; members of the technical working groups for indexing and abstracting who responded to this task beyond their call of duty; faculty members and non-teaching staffs of the DACUN member-schools for their encouragement and logistical support; colleagues in the library profession, particularly Prof. Salvacion M. Arlante, University Librarian of UP Diliman and Director Prudenciana Cruz of the National Library, for believing in our capacity to produce this work despite the skepticisms; friends and advertisers who made sure our index and abstract go to the printing press in time for its public launching; Prof. Aurelia Luzviminda Gomez and the guards at the School of Management, UP in Mindanao, Terraza Milesa for their support; countless other individuals and groups who have anonymously supported us; Dr. Cristina Pendor of HCDC for acting as the language editor despite her hectic schedule; Ramil, Ron, and Alex of UP Mindanao and Jeffrey of RMC for sharing four sleepless nights with me in the layout and press work; other persons and groups I might have inadvertently missed on this space; my family for their love, patience and understanding; and above all to God the Lord Almighty from whom all information, knowledge, and wisdom come, my boundless and sincerest gratitude.

introduction

This publication, the DACUN Abstract International (DAI), is a collection of abstracts of theses and dissertations defended at DACUN member schools. It is the result of our seminar - workshop on the topic "Abstracting and Indexing" sponsored by the DACUN Library Committee. It is considered as a major undertaking and the product of hard work, skills and expertise of the librarians.

This is another type of reference guide for researchers. It does not only provide a systematic list of theses and dissertations but also includes a brief and comprehensive representation of the original documents.

This book contains the 2004 theses and dissertation abstracts in the social sciences from such fields as education, local government and public administration arranged alphabetically by authors. Original manuscripts of the theses and dissertations are found at the libraries of the eleven member DACUN libraries,

Each entry in the abstract contains the name of the author or researcher, title of the thesis or dissertation, degree program to which it was submitted for oral defense, collation, and the abstract identification number represented by the call number of the thesis or dissertation, lest it be construed as a product code. Names of abstracters are italicized at the bottom right part of the abstract. Instead of subject headings, the technical working group for abstracting decided to adopt the descriptors available from Sear's List and the Library of Congress Subject Headings. Last entry in the abstract is the DRL, or the DACUN Resource Locator, which signifies where the thesis or dissertation is accessible.

To further help the researcher, DAI provides an author-subject index at the end of the abstracts, a list of abbreviations and acronyms used, directions for use, arrangement of entries, and bibliographic data. Instructions on how to order for additional copies for this particular and succeeding issue are also given.

May this be of help to every researcher, graduate and undergraduate students, librarians, and information professionals.

How to use the DACUN Abstracts International

The DACUN Abstracts International is published quarterly by the Davao Colleges and Universities Network and includes master's theses and doctoral dissertations of 11 DACUN participating institutions in Davao City, Philippines.

Each abstract, up to a maximum of 250 words in length, describes the original research work on which the abstract is based.

This edition contains abstracts in the social sciences particularly in education, local government and public administration.

Arrangement of Entries

Entries are arranged alphabetically according to a discipline then, by author. Not all disciplines will appear in every issue of DAI.

Bibliographic Data

All bibliographic data appear at the head of the entry. The abstract then follows. Each entry contains the following essential information:

- Author/Researcher
- Title
- Institution Granting the Degree
- Year finished
- Major/Concentration
- Number of pages in the original
- Thesis
- Abstract Number
- · The Abstract itself
- Descriptors
- DACUN Resource Locator labeled as DRL in the text

Index

Each quarterly issue contains an author-subject index arranged alphabetically. The index, found at the end of the abstracts, contains page numbers where the term is located.

Direction for Use

To find information on a specific topic or research, use the author-subject index.

List of general abbreviations of abstract terms, course program and participating institutions are also provided in the publication.
